Guide for the Use of Sedation in the Practice of Dentistry

In the past several months, the Florida Board of Dentistry has made substantial changes to the Chapter of the *Florida Administrative Code*, which governs the use of anesthesia. These changes are expected to increase access to sedation services for dental patients while also increasing patient safety. These sedation services are also expected to have a positive economic benefit to business while decreasing costs of sedation services to patients.

In response to these changes, David Flynn, Esq., our excellent board attorney with the Florida Attorney General's office prepared a *Guide to Sedation in the Practice of Dentistry*. This guide is intended to be a basic outline covering a select few areas of sedation, in particular, areas that were recently updated by rule.

Generally, a dentist may not use, employ the use of or administer general anesthesia, deep sedation, conscious sedation or pediatric conscious sedation without first obtaining a permit, properly equipping the outpatient dental office, and passing a board inspection.

The Board of Dentistry has established three types of sedation permits: 1) A General Anesthesia Permit; 2) A Conscious Sedation Permit; and 3) A Pediatric Conscious Sedation Permit. Each type of permit requires a very specific type of training and education before the permit is issued. Each type of permit has specific allowances and limitations.

August 22-23, 2013 Board Meeting Recap

Dr. Dan Gesek, Chairman of the Board of Dentistry, held a rules workshop on the evening of August 23, 2013, with discussions regarding the use of a qualified anesthetist. This meeting was followed by comments and reviews on anesthesia rules and the use of sedation in the practice of dentistry. The following day, August 23, 2013, the Board reviewed 13 disciplinary cases, accepting seven settlement agreements, three waiver/default cases, two voluntary relinquishments and a recommended order. The Board also took action on three petitions for variance and waiver. There were several application/credentials reviews. A dentist with a general anesthesia permit may use, employ the use of or administer general anesthesia, deep sedation, conscious sedation, and pediatric sedation. The general anesthesia permit holder is not limited in the type of anesthetic drug that may be utilized. A general anesthesia permit holder may employ the use of anesthesia on any dental patient. This includes adult patients, special needs patients of all ages and pediatric patients.

A conscious sedation permit holder may use, employ the use of or administer conscious sedation and pediatric conscious sedation. A conscious sedation permit holder may not use, employ the use of or administer propofol, methohexital, thiopental, etomidate or ketamine. A conscious sedation permit holder may employ the use of conscious sedation on any dental patient. This includes adult patients, special needs patients of all ages and pediatric patients.

A pediatric conscious sedation permit holder may use, employ the use of or administer pediatric conscious sedation. A pediatric conscious sedation permit holder may not employ the use of or administer propofol, methohexital, thiopental, etomidate, or ketamine. A pediatric conscious sedation permit holder may only employ the use of pediatric conscious sedation on pediatric patients and special needs patients regardless of age. A pediatric or child patient is defined as anyone less than 18 years of age. A special needs patient is any person, regardless of age, who has a physical or mental impairment that substantially limits one or more life activities.

All dentists should review each rule for themselves. If a dentist has questions or concerns, they should seek clarity through the Florida Board of Dentistry or through private counsel.
